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## 1. Document Description

This document collects notes on data and methodology, as well as supplementary aggregated data, underlying the analyses presented in David-Antoine Williams, 'Women's Words and the Words of Women in the *Oxford English Dictionary*', in *Review of English Studies* (2023, [DOI:10.1093/res/hgad052](https://doi.org/10.1093/res/hgad052)). References in that article to 'Supplementary Data & Notes' refer to this document.

## 2. Notes on Corpora and Methods

NB. Names of original corpora subject to analysis are styled in boldface in these notes.

- 2.1. In order to parse different editions and revisions of the OED's famously intricate patchwork, here I cross-compare the background data of several primary sources, namely: the 1987 Tri-Star CD-ROM publication of the 1928 OED1, revised (**1E**), public domain PDFs of the 1888–1928 OED1 and 1933 SUP1 kept at archive.org and other repositories, the 1989 pseudo-SGML-coded text of OED2 (**2E**), and an XML version of the June 2022 release of OED3 (**3Etxt**), its bibliography (**3Ebib**), index of new materials (**3Enew**), and index of publication origin (**3Eorig**), provided under license by Oxford University Press. **2E** has been the subject of a metadata enhancement project at St Jerome's University (Waterloo, Ontario) since 2011, and has been annotated to reflect, among other things, the gender of the author and the edition each quotation was added. The SUP1 corpus summarized here includes only material retained in **2E**; consequently it is not discussed per se, but rather as part of the SUP2 revision. The revisions and additions made by Simpson and Weiner for OED2 are amalgamated with SUP2, as are the 1993–1997 Additional Series with OED3. Thus three main periods of dictionary making are studied here, corresponding to one (though perhaps not the only) rational way of demarcating the three 'editions' of OED.

- 2.2. Derived datasets may be supplied on request; enquiries are welcome. All OED data is published by Oxford University Press. I am indebted to several individuals at OUP who have assisted me at various stages of my work on the dictionary, especially James McCracken for guidance on the data's structure and provenance.
- 2.3. Gender metadata for OED2 quotations (including OED1 quotations) was annotated by researchers as part of the project described above. Another, related project sought to match the bibliographical details of post-1700 OED3 sources (including of retained OED1/2 quotations), derived either from **3Etxt** or **3Ebib**, to one or more large bibliographical databases, which included the HathiTrust Digital Library (17.1 million records) and associated datasets, the Library of Congress Catalog (9.4 million records), Google Books API (~40 million records), the LibraryCloud Item API of Harvard University Libraries (20 million records), and the Trove catalog of the National Library of Australia. Bibliographical (MARC) metadata was imported from these matches, including Library of Congress shelf-marks and given (fore-) names of authors where available. The gender of these was at first predicted algorithmically by three gender-inference Python modules running in four modes, then verified manually in uncertain cases (e.g., if modules disagreed, did not recognize a forename, or could not predict a gender from a forename). - 2.4. Though a number of other approaches are possible, for the purposes of consistency in this study, definitions and policies were set as follows. 'Sources' correspond to records of authored books in **1E**, **2E** and **3Etxt** and/or **3Ebib** (which contain many duplicate records), excluding edited collections, articles in periodicals, and any source without a named author. 'Author' refers to the person or persons who selected the vocabulary item in question (i.e. the headword represented in the quoted text), rather than any other type of contributor to a work (e.g. an editor or compiler). Translators are thus selected over original authors where identifiable, as are ghost-writers over credited authors. In the case of pseudonyms and *noms-de-plume*, typically the gender annotation corresponds to the real person behind the authorial persona, if this is or was generally known at the time of selection by OED, and/or is reasonably knowable now (e.g., via Wikipedia or other sources). 'Gender', arguably the most contestable term here, typically refers to the publicly available gender-role identity of the author. In almost all OED quotations, the author gender, if known, is either 'male' or 'female', or 'both' in the case of certain co- and multi-authored works. With the exception of *Twitter.com*, from which authors identifying as nonbinary, genderqueer and nonconforming, and/or gender-fluid are cited nineteen times (1% of person-identified Twitter citations), nonbinary authors do not make up a statistically observable portion of any large subset of quotations.

These policies at times come up against matters of contention in gender theory, never more saliently than when details of an author's biography appear from a contemporary perspective to strain against their historically or conventionally construed gender identity. As it happens the prominent cases are usually annotated here according to this policy as 'female'; including such diverse gender personae as, e.g., those of Louisa May Alcott or Vernon Lee.

Not all OED sources could be assigned a gender, for one or more of the following reasons: the source was not annotated as a part of the OED2 enhancement project described above; neither **3Etxt** or **3Ebib** contained determinative forename information for it; it could not be matched to an external bibliographical record or biographical source; or matched records and other sources did not contain determinative author information.

- 2.5. Following the procedures described above produced annotated corpora of 0.72 million OED1 quotations, 0.99 million **2E** quotations, and 1.41 million **3Etxt** quotations falling within the 'focus' area, i.e. post-1700 books with an author (contains an <a> tag) that are not sub-works such as book chapters or articles (does not contain a <bibSub> tag). Of these focus quotations, >99% of OED1 and OED2 quotations, and 98% of OED3 quotations were annotated as having an author of 'male' or 'female' gender (or 'both'), amounting to 73%, 65%, and 52%, respectively, of all quotations (i.e. including non-focus quotations) dated 1700 or later. The increasing gap between focus quotations and all quotations is due to the progressively larger number of 'authorless' OED sources, mainly newspapers, periodicals, patents, and so on, across OED editions. Section 3.1, below, provides annotation details for the various OED corpora.

A second-level subcorpus assigned a Library of Congress shelf-mark (LC Class) to 1.04 million OED3 focus quotations, representing 72% of all OED3 focus quotations, and 74% of newly added (OED3n) focus quotations. Explaining part of the discrepancy of the overlapping dataset is the different date distribution of volumes within the LC matching corpora (principally **LOC**, **HATHI**, and **Harvard**)—these libraries have more recent works than older works, and the more recent works are more likely to have LC classes. Matching occurred more frequently for later volumes: 80% for OED3 quotations 1950–2022 (81% for OED3n quotations in that period). For this reason comparative analysis has been split out in the article discussion between the whole period and the more recent period. Section 3.4, below, provides annotation details for this subcorpus of LC matching quotations.

- 2.6. Two comparator corpora, **LOC** ( 3.7 million volumes) and **HATHI** ( 2.6 million volumes), were assembled from open-access datasets, viz the 9.4 million records of the Library of Congress 2016 MARC Distribution Services Connect catalog ([https://www.loc.gov/cds/products/MDS\\_Connect-books\\_all.html](https://www.loc.gov/cds/products/MDS_Connect-books_all.html)) and the 17.1 million records of the HathiTrust Research Center Extracted Features Dataset v.2.0 (Jacob Jett, Boris Capitanu, Deren Kudeki, Timothy Cole, Yuerong Hu, Peter Organisciak, Ted Underwood, Eleanor Dickson Koehl, Ryan Dubnick, J.

Stephen Downie. HathiTrust Research Center [2020]. [DOI: 10.13012/R2TE-C227](https://doi.org/10.13012/R2TE-C227)), respectively. Each corpus was restricted to English-language book publications containing at least one author name, and then lightly autodeduplicated using a token composed of the author initial, author surname, and first ten characters of the title, excluding initial 'A', 'An', and 'The'. **HATHI** was further deduplicated using the HathiTrust record number, which consolidates identical volumes from different donor libraries. The gender inference protocol described in §2.1 was run with the forename fields present in each corpus. 9% of **LOC** and 7% of **HATHI** records could not be annotated for gender because they contained unidentifiable forenames, or (only) unisex forenames, or only initials, or no forename. The remainder (3.3 million and 2.4 million, respectively) were annotated as 'female'-authored, 'male'-authored, or 'both'.

**LOC** can be subdivided by LC Class (i.e. shelf-mark). **HATHI** can be split into Fiction and non-Fiction subsets, according to the HathiTrust genre classification (see William Underwood, 'Understanding Genre in a Collection of a Million Volumes' [2015] [DOI: 10.17613/M6W07V](https://doi.org/10.17613/M6W07V)).

The resulting gender proportions in **HATHI** are generally in line with two previous studies: Chris Forster, 'A Walk Through the Metadata: Gender in the HathiTrust Dataset' (8 September 2015) <https://web.archive.org/web/20210825183539/https://cforster.com/2015/09/gender-in-hathitrust-dataset/>; and William Underwood, David Bamman, and Sabrina Lee, 'The Transformation of Gender in English-Language Fiction', in *Cultural Analytics* (13 February 2018) [DOI: 10.22148/16.019](https://doi.org/10.22148/16.019). See Forster for a comparison with figures in Garside et al.; and Underwood et al., 4–10, for a discussion of factors potentially influencing the HathiTrust Fiction curve, including both the particularities of the dataset and the historical social contexts.

- 2.7. Data referred to as **ENBS** derive from the three bibliographical surveys of the English novel cited, with minor modifications to align them with OED data. Most significantly, principles regarding the treatment of anonymous, pseudonymous, and translated works detailed in Note 2.3, above, have been applied. Although much of Garside et al. vol. 2 is available via an online interface at <http://www.british-fiction.cf.ac.uk/>, that data bears significant discrepancies compared to the published bibliography (as do the resources stored at <https://github.com/novels-project/british-fiction-1770-1836>, which derive from a version of the online database). In the analyses presented here, unless specifically referencing another source, **ENBS** data has been reconstructed from the print bibliographies, and supplemented by the seven updates (2000–2020) found at <http://www.romtext.org.uk/reports/>. Gender inference for authors has likewise been conducted anew, using the same policies and processes as for OED sources (described in Note 2.3, above). Thus the various figures presented here may differ slightly from those published in Garside et al., though the overall picture remains substantively the same.

### 3. Aggregated and Derived Data

#### 3.1. Gender of OED Quotations per Edition, by Quotation Year

In these tables, columns *M* and *F* count the number of quotations with at least one author of male or female gender, respectively. *Tf* counts all focus quotations. *Ta* counts the total of all quotations (i.e. including non-focus, or ‘authorless’ quotations).

### 3.2. Most Cited Female Authors per OED Edition

These tables count all female-authored quotations in each edition, by author name (or combination in cases of co-authorship). OED1, SUP1, and SUP2 female author names have been deduplicated to account for the variety of forms in which they appear in those editions. The thirty-most-cited (*rF*) sources are listed for each edition or revision, with the total number of citations attributed to each (*Qs*).

The second column (*rA*) gives an indication of where such a tally might rank among all authored sources (excluding sources without a named author, like *The Times*). However, as male authors were not similarly deduplicated for this study, this figure should be taken as a theoretical upper limit; in actuality many will come several ranks lower (more so for lower ranked names).

### 3.6. OED3 Quotation Gender by Sense Subject Category

Sense Subject Categories are assigned to all quotations in senses falling under the labeled sense, differentiated to the small-alpha (subsense) level. That is, if an Arabic-numbered (main) sense carries a label, all small-alpha subsenses under it are assigned that label; if an entry carries a label, all senses within it are so labelled. The label given is a lightly deduplicated token of what actually appears in the dictionary text, usually in its most complete or standard form (e.g. *Eton College slang* appears in OED2 as *Eton*, *Eton College*, and *Eton College slang*). No further aggregation is performed here; e.g. Eton Football is kept distinct.

### 3.7. OED3 Quotation Gender by *Historical Thesaurus of the OED* (HTOED) Endpoints

In treating HTOED, I have differentiated endpoints, i.e. categories that contain senses particular to them, from categories in general, which may or may not contain senses particular to them, and may or may not contain subcategories. Thus, figures for 'Thesaurus Category' aggregate all quotations in that category and any subcategory, while those for 'Thesaurus Endpoint' aggregate only quotations particular to that category, ignoring senses that pertain to subcategories.

Because the HTOED classification is highly specific, many endpoints contain relatively few senses and/or quotations, which raises a statistical issue, especially when dealing with quotation subsets (e.g. only newly added modern quotations). Thus, in cases where endpoints contain fewer than ten annotated quotations, they are aggregated upwards to the nearest category with that number or more, which is then treated as the endpoint. The final figures for 'Thesaurus Endpoints' thus represent the most specific category for which there are annotated quotation datapoints above that threshold.




Figure 2 – Percentage Female Authorship in OED Quotations and two Comparator Corpora, 1700–2022. Dots represent figures calculated for each year, while lines represent a 25-year trailing average.




Figure 3 – Difference in Percentage of OED Quotations with a Female Author, vs Figure 2.f, HATHI Volumes, 1700–2020 (trailing 25-year average).




Figure 4 – Percentage of Women-Authored Quotations in OED3 by Top-level Subject Category. Dots show total number of quotations in category, in thousands.




Figure 5 – Percentage of Women-Authored Quotations in OED3 vs Volumes in LOC (date-weighted), by LC Class. The width of each line along the x-axis is proportional to the relative size of the class subset within the relevant dataset.
